IKE & McCarthy with Dr. Nichols

You're invited to hear from Dr. David Nichols, author of *Ike and McCarthy* at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 10, in the Community Room.

The book is Dr. Nichols latest. Senator Joseph McCarthy first seized headlines in 1950 when he falsely claimed to have the names of 205 communists in the State Department. Therafter, he presided over "a permanent floating press conference. Lights, cameras, microphones followed him everywhere." The misperception then, and for decades to follow, is that Eisenhower—elected president in November, 1952—was unwilling to personally challenge McCarthy as he relentlessly pursued his anti-Communist witch hunt. *Ike and McCarthy* proves this portrayal is false: Eisenhower loathed McCarthy and absolutely understood the threat he posed.

Dr. Nichols, a leading expert on the Eisenhower presidency, holds a PhD in History from the College of Willi am and Mary. He is the author of *A Matter of Juscitce: Eisenhower and the Beginning of the Civil Rights Revolution* and *Eisenhower 1956: The President's Year of Crisis.*

Outdoor Encounters By Nathan Bolls

With many of you, this past 21 August, I witnessed one of the ephemeral fireflies of the Cosmos: the total lunar eclipse of the sun. On Sunday I had searched out a particular site, which turned out to be 35 crow miles NW of Beatrice, NE, and less than a mile from the mid-line of the eclipse totality band. I would have two minutes and 30-plus seconds of totality—enough time for development of the side effects I most wanted to experience: coolness, darkness, quietness of wild creatures, and the diamond ring. I had found a small parking lot with a primitive boat ramp serving a cattail-ringed lake that was the centerpiece of the Swan Lake Wildlife Management Area. Important were the site's remoteness and the fact that it was surrounded by trees, shrubs, and cattails, making it both prime bird habitat and a good place to overnight in my van/camper. Only one other vehicle overnighted there.

By late Monday morning, six other cars had found the lot before show time. As the moon began cutting into our star, a deepening mid-day dusk shadowed the cooling air. Vocal cords revealed an increasing excitement. Red-winged blackbirds and marsh wrens, usually busy in and around the cattails, were becoming less active. The number of bank swallows slicing air in pursuit of insects was decreasing. Soon there were none.

When the moon snapped shut that last rim of sun, a sharp drop in visibility occurred; I could not read a license plate 30 feet away. The air became cooler, faster. The sun's corona glowed full around, and a deep spiritual quiet settled over both land and people. Our period of totality gave sufficient time to absorb a good dose of humility. But, aware of dire forecasts associated with the approaching storm "Harvey." I was conflicted.

As the spheres moved on—the sun's corona still in view—an arc of sun rim flashed free from behind the moon's trailing edge, giving us a beautiful, but ephemeral, diamond ring. While the spheres moved apart, the insight arose that none of us had the slightest measure of control over any of what we had just seen.

Then came the realization that that ring stood for us. For each of the countless thousands of us who watched the shadow of that ephemeral celestial union racing eastward across our great and troubled land. For each of us, during our own period of darkness, as we symbolically joined hands and hearts to share a moment of wonderment.

<u>Updates</u>

General Update: Lonnie shared that the demolition phase for the renovation in Verna Belle's Café is complete. Framing will start after Sept. 20. Carpet will be installed in the Community Room starting at 5 p.m. today, Sept. 11. We are also looking to add carpet in the Tranquility Room and to make it more useful for meeting room space.

Moving forward, we are looking at options for better usage of the courtyard and patio area. Some ideas that have been presented are having a garden party and other events that can be held outside. We also plan to entertain ideas on looking to maximize the use of the Game Room. We will work with Becky Fitzgerald and the Foundation when addressing possible redesigns of the area. Part of this process would include re-locating the mailboxes/internal cubbies from the Game Room to outside the Community Room. This would mean creating cart storage on each floor to house a specific number of carts per area.

Approval of August Minutes: Motion to approve minutes was moved and passed.

New Business: Nyle Larson reported on behalf of the Gift Committee. Envelopes were delivered and mailed out on August 23, both locally and out of town. Their next meeting is scheduled for October 25.

Old Business: Bob Crawford reported the Board of Trustees met on August 31, 2017. The meeting was called to order by Fred Borck. Lonnie Baker reported to the Board, the census of residents at Meadowlark was trending upward with the past two months showing the highest healthcare census since October of 2014. Lonnie also reported the executive staff continues to explore new opportunities to better position Meadowlark to deal with the ever changing environment on senior living and health care.

The Board received and approved various financial statements including an overall report of satisfaction from the auditors concerning the fiscal health of Meadowlark. The Board also approved updated policies for various services and it was expressed Meadowlark is consistent with policies remaining in full compliance with regulations. Meadowlark Foundation remains in good health.

Additional Discussion Topics: A question in regards to longer delivery time on orders from the kitchen in Prairie Star was brought up.
