### **Outdoor Opportunities**

submitted by Nathan Bolls All through the fall, winter, and spring we on campus have been privileged to hear calls of both the barred and great horned owls. Both rank among the largest of owls in North America. Field guides usually describe their calls as follows: great horned owl, owl—four to six resonant hoots, with rhythms varying with the owl; barred owl-"hoo—hoo—boohoo," That comes out as a slightly shrill and insistent "Who cooks for you?" The barred owl also sometimes calls during the day.

Their superb sense of hearing makes them "mousers" of the first rank. But both owls feed on a wide variety of animals: insects. mice, squirrels, amphibians, and rabbits. The great horned, slightly larger, and a fearsome make this possible. This trait hunter, ranges across the entire lower Forty-Eight, plus much of Canada, Alaska, and Mexico. It also has been known to take skunks, crows, porcupines, domestic cats, ospreys, porcupines, and great developed by the Spanish blue herons, as well as other hawks and owls. All owls cough up pellets of undigested fur, bones, and feathers. Piles of these pellets can build up beneath an owl's nesting spot.

All owls tend to be solitary outside the breeding season.

They choose a variety of nesting sites, including tree hollows, old nests of hawks or crows, or a cliff ledge. The barred owl will come to a nest box if the entrance is at least six inches in diameter. It's kinda like "Where does an 800 -pound gorilla sleep?" But they prefer nesting sites that often referred to as the "hoot" are high—between 25-80 feet above the ground.

> I don't know about the veracity of connecting owls with wisdom, but they are patient hunters and incredibly silent in flight—due to the way the ends of their feathers are constructed. They are famous for being able to turn their heads, some as much as 270 degrees! That is forty-five degrees behind looking ether full left or right. A couple of neck anatomical differences between owls and humans is helpful because owls cannot moves their eyeballs as we do.

The owl plays a significant role in many native religions and also has a place in the rituals of the culture Catholic settlers that came to the American Southwest several centuries ago. This bird, misunderstood by some—and, thus, feared—is a mysterious, masterful, majestic, and magnificent animal!

# **Voter Registration for state election year** *submitted by Kay Shanks*

It's that time again and we have a State Election coming up. If you have moved your residence to or within Meadowlark since the last election, law requires you to reregister to update your voter registration, by filling it out with your new address. If you do not update your address, your ballot may be returned to the Clerk's office. Ballots cannot be forwarded. If you are unsure, you can get a Voter Application at the front desk or from Kay Shanks, 539-2066.

Are you new to Kansas? Would you like to register to vote? If so, you will need to complete a new voter registration application and you may be required to provide proof of citizenship. It can be a little more difficult but Kay would be glad to help you get the required forms and answer questions you may have.

The deadline to register is **July 17 for the Primary. Election Day will be on Tuesday, Aug. 7.** The deadline for to register for the General is **Oct. 16.** The **General Election is on Tuesday, Nov. 6.** If you are not sure about your voter registration, please feel free to call the Riley
County Clerk's Office at (785) 537-6300 and ask for Anita Cook. She has access to search the State of Kansas to see if you have registered or not.

Would you like a ballot mailed to you? We have forms up front or you can call the Riley County Clerk's office and Anita will see one gets sent to you. Again, this process can be difficult, but Kay is very knowledgeable and would be glad to help you get you the forms as well as answer any question you may have. If she is unable to answer your question, she will call the clerk's office and get you the information you need.

Pat welcomed all meeting attendees.

#### **Updates**

General Update: Lonnie shared that the new fiscal year starts June 1 and the Meadowlark team is planning on three major projects being its focus. The first being addressed will be the kitchen in Prairie Star Restaurant. We have received some raw numbers on the project and the decision to build a new kitchen rather than remodel the current was suggested as they would be very similar in cost. With building a new kitchen, it creates a horseshoe effect around the patio space with the new addition being built to the east. The hope with the patio space is to enclose it and add ample lighting to create a nice bright warm space. Building a new kitchen also will allow us to take what is the current kitchen and expand the dining space into that area. Construction of the kitchen is expected to start early 2019.

The second project is parking. We are looking at July of this year to move forward with construction. We will build a parking lot behind the maintenance shop which will accommodate 25 vehicles. The intent is to park all Meadowlark and maintenance staff vehicles in this area. This will open up several spots for regular parking in the addition of another six spots up front along Meadowlark Road.

The third project is the courtyard which is accessible from the Game Room and Verna Belle's Cafe. The ideas are to gut the area and add covered seating with electric, to have most of the space walkable with pavers and more paths, possibly a putting green, bocce court and an outdoor serving table or bar area. There is no time table on this project at this point. Becky Fitzgerald will take the lead on fundraising for the courtyard project.

Lonnie also shared that Lyle Butler with the Chamber is retiring.

Support Services Update: Jayme explained the Physician's Practice has added more Nurse Practitioner hours with Jen Peterson going on maternity leave. Jen plans to return in August.

Regarding the potential childcare service here on campus, we are still exploring options and taking the appropriate steps to move forward.

Jonathon Meyer, Bruna Abdo and Megan Thompson have been hired as the new Service Managers for Prairie Star Restaurant. They will be working mostly in the evenings and on the weekends.

**Approval of April Minutes:** Motion to approve minutes was moved and passed.

### **New Business**

Pat introduced Elaine Manges as the new  $2^{nd}$  Floor Representative.

Jo Lyle was reelected for another term as the Tuttle Creek Representative.

The question about solar panel and windmill usage was raised. Lonnie expressed that this subject was discussed years ago prior to his arrival. His understanding was without external federal money, the cost of upkeep and maintenance would not benefit Meadowlark to invest in alternative energy sources at this time, but he would look into it.

Old Business: None.

#### **Additional Discussion Topics**

A request to possibly have raised garden beds in the Meadowlark Community Garden was brought up. It was explained that the garden area is run by residents, but Mark Morton could be a good resource.
