20th Travelers tour features attractions in Hot Springs, Bentonville

By Becky Fitzgerald We're just a few weeks into fall, but it's not too early to think about spring. Meadowlark's travel program began in the fall of 2004 with a trip to Branson, and for our 20th adventure, Monte Spiller and I are as giddy as Sesame Street characters thinking about the letter "A".

Again working with a Canadian travel agency, we've put together five days and four nights, primarily in Arkansas. Tour dates are April 11—15, 2019, and we've scheduled action, architecture and art.

In addition, we've planned a driving route to take advantage of Arkansas'





amazing views. Here's a list of tour highlights:

~ National Scenic 7 Byway: Arguably one of the most scenic drives in America, the route winds through four of Arkansas's varied geographical regions. We'll take Highway 7 from Harrison to Hot Springs, crossing over the Buffalo National River and through the Ozark National Forest. ~ Arkansas Derby: The dates of this adventure were set to coincide with this \$1 million race, which over the past 15 years has become one of the most productive prep races for

the Triple Crown races, which start the first Saturday in May with the Kentucky Derby.

The action takes place at Oaklawn Racing & Gaming in Hot Springs. Tourgoers may watch the race live or on monitors located throughout the complex. Ladies, pack a fancy hat!

Other Hot Springs attractions include a tour at Fordyce Bathhouse, boasting stained glass ceilings, marble walls and statues, and a dinner cruise on the Belle of Hot Springs riverboat. ~ Crystal Bridges **Museum of American Art:** The museum takes its name from a nearby natural spring and the bridge construction incorporated in the building. We plan to spend 5 and a half hours at the museum over two days as there is much to see, including a house designed by renowned

Updates

General Update: Meadowlark has approved Kevin Cowan as the architect to head up the Praire Star Kitchen renovation. The start date for the renovation is estimated to take place in February or March of 2019. Prior to that date, we will hold a discussion forum to get feedback and ideas from residents and others of what they would like to have included with the renovation. Those discussion will also include the atrium/event center that will expand onto the patio area.

Meadowlark will visit Blueville Nursery to look at samples and the layout options that are being proposed to go in the courtyard. A walking trail has also been added around the exterior of the courtyard and we are looking at a tinted film to place on windows where you can't see in but an individual inside can see out. The fundraising for the Courtyard renovation is going very well and we are getting close to meeting the budgeted number.

Jayme met with a designer last week in regards to the front lobby. We will have another open session to discuss wants, such as furniture, design aesthetic and input concerning the front area. A timeline on this project has yet to be determined.

It's that time again! The 2018 General State
Election is around the corner. If you have moved
your residence to or within Meadowlark since the
last election, law requires you to re-register
updating your information with your new
address. If you do not update your address, your
ballot may be returned to the Clerk's
office. Ballots cannot be forwarded. If you are
unsure, you can either get a Voter Registration
Application at the Hospitality Desk, contact Kay
Shanks at 539-2066, or contact the Riley County
Clerk's office at 537-6300.

Are you new to Kansas and would like to register to vote? If so, you will need to complete a new voter registration application.

The deadline to register to vote or update your information is Oct. 16. Election Day is on Tuesday, Nov. 6, 2018. If you are not sure about your voter registration, feel free to call the Riley County Clerk's Office at 785-537-6300. They have access to search the State of Kansas to see if you have registered or not.

Absentee Ballots will be mailed Oct. 17, and must be date stamped for return no later than election day, Nov. 6, 2018 and received at the Clerk's Office by Nov. 9, at noon. If you would like to receive a Permanent Advance Ballot, you may get a form at the Hospitality Desk. If you find that the form is difficult, Kay is very knowledgeable and would be glad to help get you the forms as well as answer any question you may have. If she is unable to answer your question, she will call the clerk's office and get you the information you need.

Outdoor Encounters

We soon will lose our summer umbrella of living shingles: the marvelous evolutionary development we call the green plant leaf. In addition to the leafs' essential process of photosynthesis, they offer shade to plants, animals, and soils in thousands of different ways.

But leaves, even on conifer trees, are temporary structures. For deciduous trees, we celebrate this ephemerality by looking forward to the change in leaf colors—our palette of fall--knowing full well that color change is related to leaf drop and death.

Several factors influence fall leaf color: increasing night length, lowering air temperatures, distribution of leaf pigments, and genetics. Genetics determine why leaves or fruits of certain species turn certain colors. But the astronomically-based trend of steadily longer nights during fall is the big unvarying factor in the equation. Color intensity is enhanced by ample

rainfall and by steadily falling air temperatures, but is impeded by suddenly freezing temperatures.


The green pigment, chlorophyll, during the growing season, constantly is being produced and broken down within leaves, but chlorophyll production slows down and eventually stops as nights lengthen and temperatures drop. And other existing pigments are unmasked. The carotenoid pigments, present along with chlorophyll during the growing season, produce the yellow, orange, and brown pigments we see in some leaves and in corn, buttercups, carrots, daffodils, rutabagas, and bananas.

The anthocyanin pigments, most produced in leaves as days shorten and nights lengthen, give their colors to some leaves and to cranberries, red apples, blueberries, plums, Concord grapes, cherries, and strawberries. Genetics play the big role of determining the combination of carotenoid and anthocyanin pigments present in both ripe fruits and in the changing colors of leaves.

Many marvelous processes are in progress as plants and animals prepare for the cold, but one of the most obvious, and most beautiful, is that process by which trees and shrubs shed their most vulnerable parts: leaves—that will be broken down over the winter by microbes into compounds and elements that can, in turn, be used for building by both plants and animals. The cycle continues!
