2nd annual educational and awareness event on dementia and Alzheimer's

submitted by Michelle Haub, Special Programs Leader The Meadowlark Memory Program is excited to announce the details of the second Memory Matters Symposium. This free educational opportunity for those in the Flint Hills region is scheduled for



Thursday, March 21, 2019 in the Ballroom at Holiday Inn at the Campus in Manhattan. The goal of Memory Matters Symposium is to provide outreach and helping to encourage engagement and understanding; to visit with community resources and enjoy healthy ultimately helping to de-stigmatize cognitive decline/ changes. No reservations are required to attend this free event and you welcome to come and go as your schedule allows.

The evening begins at 5 p.m. with the chance to learn about local community resources including: health, fitness and specialized care for those affected by cognitive changes, dementia or Alzheimer's. Brain healthy appetizers will also be available at this time. Eric D. Vidoni, PT, PhD, is the first presenter for the evening and will present from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. He will provide an overview and a more comprehensive education about dementia and Alzheimer's, as well as explain current treatment options, both pharmacological and non-pharmacological. He will also update the audience on regional and national research trials and how they could impact these populations. Dr. Vidoni is the director of the Outreach, Recruitment and Education Core for the



University of Kansas Alzheimer's Disease Center (KU ADC). In 2001, he earned a Bachelor's of Science in Kinesiology from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He went on to complete his MSPT and PhD in 2008 at the University of Kansas. Dr. Vidoni works directly with Dr. Russell Swerdlow, KU ADC Director, on the Kansas Dementia and Aging Research Training Program

which focuses on educational outreach to medical professionals and the general public.

Following Dr. Vidoni, from 6:30 to 7 p.m., guests are education about dementia and Alzheimer's, while also encouraged to again take advantage of the opportunity appetizers.

> Sally King, MSW, LSCSW, LCSW (Licensed Clinical Social Worker - Missouri/Kansas) will continue the evening from 7 to 8 p.m. by expanding on Dr. Vidoni's presentation in regards to how dementia/Alzheimer's affects the whole person. She will suggest practical methods for caring for social and emotional well-being for those with dementia and for the caregivers. Mrs. King is a specialist in mental health counseling for adults and seniors where she has worked since 2001. Presently, she maintains a small private practice, Sally King Consulting, and is recognized nationally as a trainer and speaker in trauma care and education. Prior to starting her own company, she worked with the KU ADC on outreach, education and project management.

I am warm and comfortable, watching T.V., wrapped in a blanket, and have been to a program in the Community Room next door earlier this evening. It is cold blowing and snowing outside. However, I remember that our comfort, for all 370 some of us, comes with a price to others. On a cold morning after a snow we hear with appreciation the snow shovelers and scrapers and they are out in the cold and snow. I can go to a movie, eat at a fine restaurant, get a haircut, play a game of pool, watch a football game, and check a book out of the library without leaving the complex or even putting on my coat. But, there are others who risk the icy roads, bad storms, and slick sidewalks to get here to make our lives comfortable. Even those who come to entertain us, or to lead church for us have had to press on through the inclement weather to be here to lead, and often as volunteers.

I know that almost all of us wish we had the health to get out and shovel, or drive, or even ski or skate. But for the most part we are not able to do those things, so we remain inside, really comfortable, and are here in this wonderful place, cared for with grace and caring, at the cost of others being in the cold and snow to get here to do for us.

Yes, I know they are professionals, and paid for all this, but I am still aware of the cold, and their risks, and their endurance so that I, 80 years of age, and using walker or wheel chair, can be warm, dry, well fed, and entertained. I want to say a big thank you to the staff for all you do, and you are nice about it too, even when I am grouchy. Thanks so much for your kindness.

January 29, 1861 is the birth date for the state of
Kansas. This is a fact that all Kansas
schoolchildren knew and celebrated from first
grade through high school.

When we (my husband and I) were active in politics in Kansas we joined the state Republicans and attended the annual Kansas Day Celebrations in Topeka. The time of this story is early 1970's. Our Congressman was Bob Dole. We had backed him from the beginning of his political career when he ran for Congress after World War II from the Big First. The Big First got its name because of its size. It represented about one-half of the geographic portion of the state. Of course, it was the western portion where the population was less dense than the Eastern side.

We not only considered Bob Dole one great Representative, but felt he was a friend, also... He was the Chairman for the annual Kansas Day Dinner this particular year. Planning the evening's events for the formal dinner included appointing a hostess for each table of twelve guests. He asked me to be one of the hostesses. We were honored and very happy to accept.

Making the arrangements necessary to actually get away for the time required and find family members to take care of our work was no small task. I found very good helpers to care for our three small children. Who better than Grandparents and Aunts and Uncles? Wendell knew the best help he could find would be his Dad and brother, Wayne. Feeding the cattle and milking the cows were big chores and January weather could be bad. They agreed and he knew he had the best help he could find. He also knew pay-back time would come and he would be ready!

Of course, finding something to wear was the next thing on my list! It was formal, but that did not mean Tuxes. Suites were okay for the men, but I must have a new evening dress! I hope Wendell got a new tie. I don't remember.

My very good friend, Carmen, was a great seamstress. I found fabric and a pattern that I liked very much. And Carmen's Singer began to hum! What fun! Our plans were falling into place.

There was one more detail. Contact our good friends, Jim and Clarice Decker, to see if they



would go with us. We did. They said "yes" and when the appointed day had arrived we were on our way! The weather was fine. It was cold, of course, but bright and sunny.

When I made the hotel reservations I asked for adjoining rooms and that's what we got. As we entered our room, we heard Jim from next-door shout, "Wow! This is quite a room!" We looked around our room, opened the adjoining door and said, "We're glad., We got the closet!" And it did seem so. This was a very elegant hotel, but also very old, and I do believe they made adjoining rooms out of a once spacious suite. Oh well! We were there and ready to have a good time. The size of our room didn't matter.

It was a memorable evening. We got to meet the speaker before dinner. He was Gerald Ford! A few years down the road the two men would be on the ballot running as President and Vice President. AS Dole would say, "Vote for the Dole-Ford team. Two FOUR LETTER WORDS that are good to say!"

Now you might expect this to be the end of this little story, but there's more. After the dinner was over and my tableful of guests had departed, the four of us, Jim, Clarice, Wendell and I, were standing in the lobby deciding where we might go before going back to our rooms. We became aware of a very loud angry voice from across the way. We could see

that it was a woman shouting what she thought was important advice to Congressman Robert Dole. He was trying to politely back away but she almost had him in a corner., Then we heard him say, "You will excuse me, madam, my friends are waiting for me. I must go!" He ran over to us, "Come, let's get a cab and get out of here." We turned as one and did just that.

And that his how I happened to be in the Kansas Hotel's coffee shop, The Purple Cow, very late one night having coffee with Bob Dole and friends.




From the Land of Kansas
